Another title for your reading list comes from The University of Wisconsin Press, which is issuing Folklore Fights the Nazis: Humor in Occupied Norway, 1940-1945 for the first time in paperback (\$17.95). One may not think of occupied Norway as a very jolly place, but apparently a rich range of humor was used as a collective and often subversive survival mechanism, according to author Kathleen

Stokker, a professor of Norwegian at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, To wit: A little boy sat on a sidewalk playing with some kittens. A German officer comes along and asks, "Are those kittens you're playing with?" "No. they're Nazis," the boy says. Three weeks later, the same officer sees the boy playing with the kittens. "Are you still playing with those Nazis?" the officer asks. "No, they're not Nazis anymore: now their

eyes are open," the boy answers ... Don't like coffee? Feeling like an outsider in this land of coffeehouses?
