VASD readies budget for annual meeting

With the budget hearing set for the annual meeting to be held on Monday, August 2 at the Verona Area Middle School, the school dis-Area Middle School, the school district has released preliminary budget figures for the 1999-2000 school year. If found suitable this budget would be approved by a public vote at that meeting, and a tax levy is certified by the school board on October 18, 1999. It is important to note that the general fund budget does not reflect the recently passed school building referendum. The amount of the proposed 1999-2000 budget is \$30,335,118, an increase of 7.57% over last year's \$28,201,586 budget. The 1997-98 budget was \$26,035,737. This increase coincides with an increase in student enrollment from 4,049 to a projected 4,140, or 5.2 %.

As is always the case the majority of the proposed general fund budget will be used to cover personnel costs. \$17.6 million will be needed for teachers' salaries this upcoming year, and an additional \$846,591 has been allocated for new positions. Total personnel expenditures for 1999-2000, including extra curricular pay, teaching

Greek art is rich in tradition and human spirit

The current art show at the Biopharmaceutical Technology Center of the Promega Corporation at first glance seems to center around religion - both as ceremony and as celebration. On further inspection that interpretation is off. What it really centers around is people and their relation to each other, through participation in interactive opportunities, such as religion, ceremonies and celebrations.

The two artists that are repre-

University and his mastery of the technique, from composition to lighting, shows in each photo. His is the work of a true master artist. Photography, probably more than any other medium, brings the view-er's perceptions and life experi-ences into the interpretation of the photos. A true master can alter that photos. A true master can after that perception through focus, scale, composition and use of color or black and white imagery and its gradations.

pher/artist, this would be the exhibition to be sure to experience. He has chosen his subjects, framed them. and captured tremendous passion, grief and the entire scale of human emotion in the collection of photographs, most of which center on the human involvement in religious ceremony.

They reflect a foreign landscape to Americans, and are peopled with subjects that remind us of our ancestors from the Old Country. They are the Old Country! This is the original gene pool, unmixed and still pure Greek. The faces he has chosen are treasures infused with character and individuality. When he was living in Greece, Katsagelos saw these images as "everyday" and "uninteresting". It took the time he spent away from his home, when he was attending Brooklyn University, to regain as he puts it, "a sense of perspective and newness." Upon his return home, the images and ceremonies showed themselves to him in a new light. Katsagelos realized that these everyday landscapes of the human experience were important images to record.

This exhibit, his second in the United States, is the result of his editing and fine tuning the 15,000 original photographs. He has chosen well. These are strong pictures showing strong emotions, strong personalities, strong faith, devotion and strength that are derived through living the human experience that connects us all to each other. He has captured us well.

This exhibit is not David Giffey's first foray into Fitchburg. Many know him as the artist who

painted the wonderful murals in who as Giffey explains, Aldo Leopold's hallways. He is well known locally for his mural work, but few know him for his other artistic gift-icon painting. Giffey is the consummate artist-he

showed him what true icon painting embodied. Prior to that time, Giffey feels that his understanding of iconography was limited to very flat, mono-dimensional, unemotion-



lives for his art, and has had, as he puts it, the "privilege of being able to make his living through his art.

A member of the Greek Orthodox Church by conversion, he has painted icons for their church along with others throughout Wisconsin. Icons are the, "images used to recall spiritual and physical events worthy of memory." These are images we love to look at in the churches - beautiful paintings in gold leaf, crowning rich, living,

vibrant colors.

He learned icon painting in Greece, from master iconographer, Ioannis Carussos and his father,

al painting encased totally in tradition and perhaps, limiting. After meeting and studying with Carussos, he was gifted with the understanding of passion and the experience and understanding of transcendence of the self through creation. From that time on, Giffey felt he could truly paint icons as they should be painted - with passion.

Giffey is especially pleased with this exhibit as it shows creation - the work in process. His initial design drawings are including in the exhibit alongside pictures of the finished colorful icons. The process shown for each designed icon is a dictionary for our use in understanding the final painting. Giffey loves the rich colors of icons and is especially fond of dark blue.

Giffey says that his art is political. What are his politics? Art, to Giffey, is a, "combination of work and life. Art is a bridge to understanding. It's communication." Giffey is a great communicator, for his mission is to create those bridges that can cross over through common experiences and shared respect using the positive energy that can come from that interaction and understanding. Through under-standing comes connections and through connections comes compassion.

Both men, though artists by choice, are actually architects. bridge builders for humanity. Their chosen art forms, at first sight so different, build those human connections
